Wear "period" costumes if you have them. Spinners, bring your wheels, etc. to include handspun and/or natural-dyed yarns labeled with your name for the display basket. Those who are not spinners may want to use spinners' hand cards, etc., to help with the shawl effort. If not, bring something to work on. CAP-I-TAIL YARNS

Convergence '92 is sponsoring an exhibit of the spinning expertise of Handweavers Guild of America members to be presented at A Capital Convergence in Washington, D.C. The jurors will select CAPS and TAILS that show the most original and appropriate use of fiber and yarn structure to end use.

Eligibility and Requirements for entry

- Entry is open to all HGA members. 1.
- 2. Each entrant may enter a maximum of two items created since Convergence '90. CAPS should be make of hand spun yarn. Submit your best CAPS, tams, bonnets, beanies, ear muffs...any headcovering suitable for male, female, young or old, or dobbin! They may be knitted, crocheted, woven, etc.....use your favorite technique.

TAILS should consist of a skein of yarn that looks like something a sheep would wear with pride. The yarn must be hand spun and may consist of one fiber or a combination of fibers. You may tie the skein but not cut it. The tail should "fit" a sheep 2' 6" high at the rear. Use your imagination in providing TAILS for the Convergence '92 flock.

- There is an entry fee of \$3 per item. Make checks payable to "Convergence '92" in US funds only. 3.
- Please include a return address label, return postage and postal insurance cover (optional) when you send 4. your numbered entries and the bottom of this form. Fill out both sides of the entry form.
- Only entries received between May 15 and June 12 will be accepted for judging. Entries received outside 5. those dates will be returned unopened.
