Nancy Landrum said that she had interviewed someone with historical knowledge of fibers while she was at the Rail Road Festival in Meridian. She reminded us that a quick query as to knowledge of old handwoven pieces, weavers, or spinners should be done if a stranger makes a statement that makes you believe this person is possible resource for our study to gather historical facts of the past history of weaving and/or fibers in Mississippi.

Nancy will host another "Day In the Country" at her place on November 10. She invites any who will come to attend--she also feeds lunch!

Demonstration Policy for Pioneer Day, and other Craftsmen's Guild of Mississippi functions was discussed. 

KNITTED BELT / TIE

(submitted by Margaret Pittman)

1 strand each of at least three yarns

With #15 needles and all strands of yarn, cast on 9 sts. PATTERN STITCH - Purl 1 * yarn over, purl 2 together. Repeat from * across row. Repeat this row for pattern.

Work in pattern st. as given until piece measures approximately 46" or desired length from the beginning. Loosely bind off all sts purlwise.

If you have an aversion to purling, as I do, substitute knit for purl.

Loom Crawl Procedure

The Loom Crawl is a progressive pot-luck luncheon which occurs the second Saturday of December as a holiday party. Guild members have the opportunity to look at other members' weaving and spinning equipment. Handmade or fiber-related gifts are exchanged among those who wish to do so.

- 1. The President appoints a Loom Crawl Chair in September.
- 2. The Loom Crawl Chair (the "Chair") announces the Loom Crawl in the October newsletter and asks for volunteers among the membership to host the event.
- 3. The Chair places a reminder of the Loom Crawl in the November newsletter with an explanation of the procedure and gift exchange.
- 4. The Chair selects 3 members with 3 houses in the greater Jackson area by the November meeting. Alternatively, if a guild member, who lives outside the greater metropolitan Jackson area, offers to host the event, the entire loom crawl can take place in one location to save driving time.
- 5. The Chair announces the order of the Loom Crawl at the November meeting and asks for volunteers to sign up for food to be brought.
- 6. In November, the Chair invites members of the Craftsmen's Guild Staff, and others as appropriate, to be guests of the guild at the Loom Crawl.
- 7. An invitation, maps and a list of volunteers bringing food appears in the December issue of the guild newsletter which is published early, before the Loom Crawl.
- 8. Volunteers who have not signed up for food can still participate by bringing whatever food items may be missing from the list.
- 9. Members may bring a guest to the Loom Crawl.
- 10. Hosting members provide their house, drinks, and eating utensils. All other participating members bring food.
- 11. The Loom Crawl starts at 10:00 am. Appetizers are served in the first house. A short business meeting takes place before departing for the second house.
- 12. Lunch (traditionally soup and bread, but other luncheon items have been added over the years) is served in the second house.
- 13. Dessert is served in the third house. A gift exchange takes place here among those members who wish to participate.
- 14. Small gifts for the gift exchange should be handmade (not necessarily by the donor); alternatively, fiber related gifts can also be brought (books, supplies, etc.). Gifts should be anonymous.
- 15. The Chair collects the gifts, numbers them and lets the donor know the assigned number, so that members do not accidentally selects the gift they brought. There are two sets of numbers. One is affixed to the gift. The second is dropped in a box for the drawing.
- 16. Once all gifts have been numbered, all those who brought a gift draw a number, making sure that they don't draw their own.
- 17. Gifts are opened one at a time, starting with number 1. Once the gift is open, the donor can be identified.
- 18. Loom crawl ends around 4:00 or 5:00 PM.
- 19. The President officially thanks the Chair and the hosting members in the January newsletter. Individuals are responsible for their own thank-you's.
- 20. The Loom Crawl shall occur the second Saturday of December.
