**April** 1995

#### March Program

Linen was the focus of Nancy Landrum's presentation at the CWSG March meeting--spinning, weaving, and caring for it. She brought examples of the various stages of linen from flax stems to fiber ready for spinning to handwoven samples to machine woven textiles. Besides advising us not to be afraid of working with linen, she also gave us these tips:

Spinning: Her linen has all been wet spun. Wrap the linen in a towel and spin from the root end. Because of the length of the fiber, the draw will be longer than with most other fibers.

Finishing: Wash the linen fabric six or seven times to soften it. (Nancy lets her handwoven linen go through the spin cycle in the washing machine, even though most sources advise against it.) Air dry; do not put it in the drier. While the fabric is still damp, iron it dry. Don't iron diagonally; iron in the direction of the warp and weft to avoid stretching the fabric out of shape. The last side ironed will be shinier than the first.

Show and Tell featured Sandi's tale, illustrated with photos, of the runner she wove for the City of Yazoo City to present to the ambassador from Niger; despite finding herself short of a few necessary inches of warp, she completed the project with 6 hours to spare! Marva brought a notebook with the narrative and photos of the Homer sweater, and Lu shared her photos from the Mississippi Rags show. Margaret brought three lovely ingertip towels woven in overshot (of course!) with crocheted trim. Hazel has been working with fourth grade students through the Arts Access program, and she showed us samples of their rag weaving projects-Easter eggs, Christmas stockings, and Christmas/Easter trees. She also brought a double weave blanket that used some of her odds-and-ends in blues, greens, and browns. Marcy brought a handspun, handknitted narrow scarf in black with blue and purple sparklies; she knitted a larger version of the scarf for former CWSG member Gerry Reif.

#### March Business Meeting Minutes

The March meeting was called to order by Marva.

Minutes--it was moved and seconded that the minutes in the March newsletter be accepted as printed.

Exhibits Committee Report--Margaret Pittman reminded guild members that we have agreed to provide a spinning/weaving display for June and July at the Madison library. The theme for June is "bridal gifts," and for July, it's "red, white, and blue." Please give Margaret your entries for June by our May meeting. A guild display is also scheduled for the Colonial Mart library in October. Because National Spinning and Weaving Week takes place in October, it was suggested that the guild "go all out" to create and promote this display. It was moved, seconded, and voted to adopt "anything goes" as the theme, allowing us to showcase the diversity of our spinning and weaving projects.

Sheep-to-Shawl--April 22--Shearing will begin at 9:30 a.m., so please try to be at the Ag Museum by 9. Sandi Tucker said that she will bring several drop spindles and asked for volunteers to use them in demonstratio Kathy Cohron and Milti Leonard volunteered.

No Mistake Plantation—The May guild meeting will take place during a "field trip" to No Mistake Plantation on May 20. There will be a \$15 charge per person; Sandi will handle the reservations Expect further information soon from Lu.

Library Cabinet-As soon as the guild decides on dimensions for the cabinet, Milti's mother is ready to negotiate.

Roc Day--Several sites have been researched, including Roosevelt State Park, Percy Quinn State Parks, the Homeowner's Building in Jackson, Primo's, Allison's Wells, and the Canton Community Center/Trolio Hotel. The board recommended the Canton site as the best combination of space and affordability. Quoted rental prices are \$100 for the auditorium, \$50 for the green room, \$25 for the kitchen. Hotel rooms run from \$15-\$22 per person. Box lunches from Penn's would cost \$4.95-\$5.95; however, other food options will be considered. It was moved, seconded, and voted to accept the board's recommendation of the Canton site for our Roc Day event.

Education Committee Report—We have heard from Nancy Kahrs, who has agreed to come. I am in the process of finding some options for us so we can settle a date. So get your wheels ready for spinning cotton with Nancy Kahrs! There are 3 questionnaires about possible workshops included in this newsletter. If you did not reply at the meeting, PLEASE DO SO AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. For the Helen Currie Caire's workshop. I am requesting that you fill out your name, so that the interested folks can arrange with Helen for a mutual convenient time, if there is enough interest. For the other questionnaires, the names are not necessary as we are just polling people. Thank you!

#### **New Business**

Constitution Revision—Lu brought copies of the Directives and Bylaws and explained the revision committee's proposed changes, the first of which is correcting the name of the group to Chimneyville Weavers and Spinners Guild. Other proposed revisions include dropping "executive" from "executive board" references, changing "Director" and "Assistant Director" to "President" and "Vice President," eliminating the sponsorship of two guild members for new member applications, adding "at the board's request" to the September audit reporrequirement, changing the annual dues from "shall be \$15" to "will be set by the board," adding "Ways and Means" to the standing committee list. Under Amendments, the committee suggested adding the beginning and ending dates of our fiscal year and a provision that names and addresses of guild members will not be released without approval from the guild.

There was also some discussion among the members present about the possibility of adding Librarian to the roster of officers. Traditionally, the Historian has either served as the Librarian herself or has appointed someone to that position. Consensus was that the guild does not need to include Librarian among the board's officers.

Marva asked that everyone look over the Directives and Bylaws once again and make recommendations for revision at the April meeting.

Nominating Committee—It's almost time to chose new officers for next year. Marva appointed Sandi Tucker and Jane Dollar to a nominating committee and charged them with presenting nominees for a vote at the April meeting.

GIVE Award—The board decided to nominate Marcy for the 1995 Governor's Initiative Volunteer Excellence award for all the uncompensated work she has done for the guild, for HGA, and for spinning and weaving in general. Marva will write and submit the nomination based on a written account that Marcy has agreed to provide of all the things she's done.

Cottonlandia--The Craftsmen's Guild has decided to give one of the looms in the weaving studio (the reddish one that never seems to work properly) to the Cottonlandia Museum in Greenwood for display. The museum wants to hold a juried show, open to non-Craftsmen's Guild members, to feature items woven of cotton. The show would open in July. Debbie Stringer volunteered to check out the museum's display space the next time she is in Greenwood and report to the guild. It was moved, seconded, and voted that the CWSG would commit to doing the Cottonlandia show.

Other New Business--Skip Allen is now the active director of the Craftsmen's Guild. Anyone who plans to attend the demo at Port Gibson should let Barbara Mitchell know ASAP. Marcy was appointed supervisor for the afternoon studio clean-up.

WHAT TO WEAR. If you have clothes that suggest 'the olden days', wear them. If not, just normal togs are fine.




