Minutes of September 16, 2000

CWSG president Lu Harding called the meeting to order. Two guests were welcomed: Stephanie Keenan and Charlene Bishop, Marva Goodman's cousin and daughter. Cathy Cohron handed out name tags.

Lu expressed appreciation to the following: Marcy Petrini for the day's refreshments; Kathy Cohron for the name tags; holly Redford and Sharon Williams for their work organizing the Gravity show (and everyone else who helped and participated); and Holly and Marva for the basketry workshop.

OLD BUSINESS

There were no motions awaiting a vote. Lu explained the board is not recommending relocation to Allison's Wells in Canton due to the cost of \$70.00 per month.

The bylaws update committee held its first meeting recently. Work will continue to review and recommend updates to the bylaws. Marva is chairing the committee.

Sharon Williams announced she would include instructions in the newsletter for submitting works for *Guilded Inspirations* at Northwest Community College. Bring your entries to the Pioneer and Indian Festival Oct. 28-29. Hazel Howell will take the entries to her house where Sharon will pick them up. Show opening will be Nov. 5 from 2 to 4 P.m. The show will hang through November. Sharon will return entries during Chimneyville Crafts Festival, Dec. 1-3 in Jackson.

Holly announced that those who signed up for the Celia Quinn silk workshop would receive directions, etc. in the next couple of weeks. Nine people have registered for the workshop, which will be held Oct. 24-26 at Holly's house in Clinton.

Lu passed around photos she and Chet Cohron made during the guild's opening at Gravity. Anyone wanting reprints would contact Lu. She had double prints made.

Roc Day sign-up sheets were passed around. NEW BUSINESS

Barbara Mitchell, treasurer, reported a guild balance of \$4,377.84, excluding monies collected during the meeting for membership renewals. Dues must be paid before memberships are renewed.

Judith Noble, librarian, is working on cataloging new additions to the library, including a box of items donated by Sandi Tucker.

A spin-in sign-up sheet for October was passed around. Hazel offered to host our October meeting and spin-in at her house at 7 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 28, after the Pioneer & Indian Festival. She also is offering accommodations to any out-of-town members wishing to spend the night.

A sign-up for Pioneer & Indian Festival demonstrators was passed around. If you would like to demonstrate and have not yet signed up, contact Nancy Landrum, event chair.

Debbie Levine moved that the guild lend its name to a booth at the UMC Christmas Fare crafts show and allow members who want to participate in the show to share the \$25.00 cost of the booth. UMC is asking weavers to share a table since space is limited. Marva seconded the motion. A sign-up sheet was passed around for those interested in participating.

Holly distributed the 2000-2001 calendar of guild events. She also reported that the guild's show at Gravity was very favorably received by customers. Most members who offered works for sale sold something. Hazel moved that the guild repeat the show at Gravity in December 2001.

Holly and the Board are working on plans for mini-workshops to be held on meeting afternoons. Topics will include beading, Theo Moorman techniques, knitting and crochet, and more. A major workshop on felted hats is tentatively set for fall 2001. Holly distributed details on the basic beadstringing mini-workshop to be held at Village Beads in Ridgeland on Friday, Nov. 17, from 6-9 p.m. Each student will create a necklace and earrings using sterling silver metals. Fee is \$40.00, due by Nov. 4. For details, call Holly at 601-924-5654.

Marcy distributed sign-up sheets for study groups and explained changes in the guild's approach to study groups. Those interested are being asked to propose an individual study topic and goal, and incentive for meeting that goal. Study may be conducted in small groups or on an individual/mentor basis, but there will be no formal meetings; instruction and feedback will be through correspondence. The board will examine the requests on the sign-up sheets before determining exactly how the program will work: This new approach will make it easier for out-of-town members to participate in a study group or work with a mentor.

Marva announced that John Blough, of Brandon, has invited the guild to demonstrate and/or sell works at the Western Festival during the Dixie National Rodeo, Feb. 9-11 in Jackson. The venue offers us opportunities for educational demonstrations and sales. The festival is open to schoolchildren Friday from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. and to the public Saturday and Sunday. Several guild members demonstrated at the festival last year.

Nancy L. gave out gorgeous beetle wings, which she purchased at Convergence. The iridescent wings are featured in the book *The Shining Cloth*.

Marva announced that the Southeast Fiber Forum would be held April 20-22 at the YMCA Blue Ridge Assembly in Black Mountain, N.C. Housing and meals will be available on the grounds.

Marva also reminded members of the Sewing Extravaganza, set for Nov. 10-11 at the Clarion Hotel in Jackson. The event, sponsored by the Extension Service, will offer inexpensive miniclasses in sewing techniques.

Melba Nipper and Kathy Smith will demonstrate spinning and weaving at the Pecan Festival, Sept. 30-Oct. 1 in Richton. Pictures of them are included in the program. Anyone wishing to join them should contact Melba.

The white elephant raffle included a copy of SS&D, offered by Marva. Free tickets were provided by her as Mississippi's HGA rep.

Marcy, Nancy L., Debbie L. and Holly reported on their trip to Convergence. While there, Marcy ordered a 40-shaft loom which, regrettably, will probably not arrive in time for Loom Crawl, as she had hoped.

Finally, we drew either a tape of music, a poem or a quote, which we are to interpret in our works.

Our interpretations are due at the guild's May 19, 2001 meeting. Those who wish may exhibit them at our next show at Gravity in December 2001.

treadle wheel surgical gloves oil for wheel hand lotion smooth niddy noddy handful of dyed fleece (to spin between saran wrap samples as markers) masking tape ball winder OR lazy kate (plying) notebook and pen frame 8-10 inches square OR stretcher dishpan bars (for making Mawata squares) rubber gloves carders (cotton ones, if possible)

____ Also, have one bobbin wound at least ½ full if you have a Louet, or other wheel with strong pull....It reduces drag on fine yarns.

Please note the \$20.00 materials fee should be made payable to CWSG and is due at the beginning of the first night's class. The fee supplies students with the various silk fibers, cocoons, dyes, etc. to be used in class.

ORECTIONS TO HOLLY BENZENDALER REOLORD'S HOLDE 924-5654

[Rom North Jackson, CDadison, Ridgeland, etc. Take I-220 south to Medgar Evers exit (Exit 5) Turn LEFT at light at the end of the exit ramp Turn RIGHT at 2nd light (intersection of Medgar Evers and Northside) You are now on Northside Drive* Northside Drive eventually becomes a two-lane road (at this point you are already in Clinton)

Pass these landmarks: Cascades subdivision on left, Traceway Park playing fields/National Guard Armory on right, Northside Baptist Church on left Shell Gas Station on left
