See the "Letter from the Prez" Lu wants us to know that the letter was written before Roc Day.



## Theo Moorman Technique

A Mini Workshop with Marcy Petrini

Saturday, January 20, 2001 Northminster Baptist Church Great Hall 3955 Ridgewood Road, Jackson, MS

Class Jime: 1:00 - 5:00 p.m.

Class Description: The Theo Moorman technique is a supplementary warp and west weave used for surface embellishment. The ground warp and west form plain weave; the supplementary warp holds the discontinuous west in-lay which can be used to make images.

Directions will be distributed ahead of time so students can warp their looms. In class, we will discuss design possibilities, weave a panel suitable for a wall hanging or to be incorporated into a garment, and experiment with different in-lay weft yarns. A four-shaft loom is required for this workshop. A double warp beam IS NOT NECESSARY.

### Registration Information

The class maximum is 15 students. Registration is first come, first reserved. The workshop fee is \$30.00, which may be paid with registration; OR a \$10.00 deposit with registration will hold your place until December 3<sup>rd</sup> when the additional \$20.00 is due. Once the deposit is received, participants are responsible to pay the balance which should be received no later than December 3, 2000. Forms received without full payment or deposit will not be considered.

**Registration is not refundable, but is transferable.** If you register, but are unable to attend, you may transfer your registration to another unregistered person by notifying Holly Benzenhafer Redford *prior to the workshop*. You are responsible for securing reimbursement from your replacement.
