"RIVERSCAPE: A Journey Along the Chattahoochee" by Marva Goodman

This technique is great fun and not very well understood. It is done by opening the plys of a 'rope' and inserting other strands to interlock and form patterns. The 4-ply strand was constructed as part of the class. If you looked at your SS&D with the article written by Linda, you can tell some of the fantastic items and patterns you can produce using this technique. Her necklace made my mouth water.

I (Marva) did a beaded bracelet with Jane Overman of Jane's Fiber and Beads shop. Jane was a very good instructor who tried to pull out our own design desires in the piece we made. She showed us how to do processes, but encouraged our own design work. Of course, she has a fantastic sales booth in the vendor area, and even though we were furnished loads of supplies for the class, everybody in attendance raided her supplies. You have to see to believe.

I got to go to Gainesville to my favorite yarn shop, Yarnworks, which is a 1100 sq ft house full of bins of yarns from all over the country. I bought unique knitting yarns, one of which was a hand-dyed chenille that the shop owner brought back from a buying trip to Wales. This shop has a lot of the latest patterns, and examples knitted up for you to ooh and ahh over, which entices you to go home with something new to knit. They also carry airplane scissors that you can wear as a necklace around your neck, no sharp edges, and cute little plastic pins that hold your knitting. She will ship too. I was pleased to see a familiar yarn in the shop from our own Heritage Yarns-- a little part of home here in Florida!

I went to Sarasota to meet my 2003 TLC advisor, Mimi Smith. She asked me to explain that she is the "Other Mimi Smith," for there are two weavers with this name. If you get a chance, check out Mimi Smith's work that was published in "The Best of Weavers: Huck Lace".

Mimi sent Terry off to the motor home for a nap and I spent a few hours with her .We looked at all her yarns stored in tall cabinets, and she has an extensive library of weaving books. Her studio was built for weaving needs, which include wide file drawers where she stores articles she cuts from her favorite weaving magazines and then files in different weaving categories. Such a neat idea. .. We went from room to room admiring all her handwoven items. There was a wonderful shawl of cotton and tencel in a Huck weave and overshot snail pattern. The fabric draped and flowed with the pattern. I fell in love with one of her overshot table runners, so I feel sure it will be one of my projects. There was an overshot runner done in white on white floss, rugs, scarves and too many more to mention.

I sat at her wonderful loom; my legs just dangled off the bench, but she assures me that it works beautifully. We sat in her studio and planned our TLC year as we went through her library of wonderful books. We saw an alligator sunning by the pond at the back of the house, and on the other side of the pond was a man sunning, too!

It's the end of January and all the oranges and tangerine trees were loaded with fruit. It must be nice to pick your breakfast so fresh. I wonder if that's why the alligator hangs around waiting for it to drop? Mimi's work was wonderful, and I had a really nice time at her home.
