• Minutes: November 20, 2004 meeting

CWSG met on Saturday, November 20, 2004, at the Canton Library, with eleven members present. Vice President Nancy Landrum presided in the absence of President Sharon Williams.

Minutes for Sept. & Oct. September and October minutes have not yet been approved. The consensus was that the minutes would be approved pending clarification of the financial report, which several members were confused about (\$\$ from White Elephant vs. total guild budget). (*Clarification*: the total amount netted for the White Elephant account for the year was reported in Sept. newsletter (\$429.66) as given by Sandra to Sharon for that mtg., but the total guild budget was not reported at that time. There was no White Elephant sale in Sept.)

<u>Loom Crawl</u> December 11, the second Saturday of December, as is traditional. Judy Fain volunteered to hostess at her home in Raymond, and will send directions for the newsletter. Those present were unsure as to who the Loom Crawl chairman is, so Marcy will talk with Synnove to work out food details, etc.

(This detail has since been taken care of thanks to Marcy, and to Barbara Mitchell, the Loom Crawl chair). List of folks bringing food is included above in info. for Loom Crawl.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> Sandra Mayo reported that through September the White Elephant funds designated for the guild library total \$429.66. There is an overall total on deposit of \$3,821.71.

<u>Meeting Place</u> The "Masonic Lodge" at the Ag Museum has been booked up for quite some time. There was a suggestion from the administration that we might meet in the auditorium of the Sparkman Building, but nothing is in writing as of yet.

<u>CWSG Books</u> In connection with the state of flux of our meeting place, the status of our library resources was discussed. All of it is presently housed in Barbara Mitchell's

garage. She urged our moving it ASAP to an accessible place.

During the discussion about the library, Marcy warned against making any oral arrangement for storage space which might result in our losing control of our books, as she has seen this happen. (Our policy, however, specifies that the books are to be under lock and key, and for the exclusive use of guild members.)

<u>Public Service Project</u> Hazel, speaking for the Community Service Committee composed of herself, Sharon, Sandra Mayo, and Ann Hodges, reported that they had researched several options. They suggest that projects that we can work on during meetings would be good; they also recommend a local project rather than joining a wide-ranging project that is already established. Based on these criteria, they recommend that we make chemo caps for University Medical Center. Marcy has a pattern for these. It was noted that we will need to use extremely soft yard, and *Red Heart "Plush"* was noted as a good choice. The yarns must also be washable.

The guild was enthusiastic about this project, and the consensus was that we would also do preemie caps for UMC. Marcy also has a pattern for that, which she will send us by e-mail. Sandra Mayo moved that we accept these recommendations, and the motion passed unanimously.

Report on Pioneer Days: Harvest Festival, November 10-13Ag Museum's Old Farm House. Good reports came from all CWSG members who demonstrated during these days (despite the cold weather!), and good discussion followed. On one day, we were told that approximately a 1,000 children had attended this year's festival. Interest was expressed in finding out if we might be allowed to "adopt" the farmhouse, and do demos throughout the year since we are still trying to find a permanent place at the Ag Museum and we hope our efforts will go a long way toward helping our cause.

South East Fiber Forum Nancy gave an update on registration.

<u>Bi-State Art Competition</u> Nancy also presented info on this competition, which is held annually in Meridian.

Entry deadlines: Slides and entry form – February 14, 2005; **Submit pieces:** – March 1-11; Exhibit March 19-April 16.

January Program Hazel and Sandra are planning their program on tartans and all things Scottish. Hazel asked that anyone who is interested in a pattern for a particular name let her know soon. Members were also invited to bring anything "Scottish" that they might want to share, or "show and tell."

<u>Looms and Equipment for Sale</u> Nancy presented information on looms for sale by Roger and Ann Burkes. They are offering a Leclerc 36" Artisat, 4-harness; 15" Dorothy table loom; 20"Penelope tapestry/rigid heddle loom. Their number is (601)635-3253.

<u>Informal Activities</u> Members enjoyed an informal White Elephant sale (which in some cases became a "Buy It Now" a la E-Bay!) and show and tell, after which the official meeting was adjourned by Nancy.

Those present stayed and visited and knitted until time to vacate the library, then went to lunch together at Harkins'.
