Frigg, the Norse goddess of weaving and spinning

Frigg, also known as Frigga or Freya, was the Norse goddess of the sky, marriage, childbirth, motherhood, wisdom, household management, weaving, and spinning. She was the wife of Odin and the mother of Thor.

As the goddess of spinning, she spun the clouds in the sky. Frigg is often depicted with a spindle or a spinning wheel. This image is not only associated with domesticity, but also with the power over life and death. This leads to her dominion over weaving. Frigg also wove the threads of fate, known as Wyrd (pronounced "weird"). This is where we get sayings such as, "Man, that was weird!" Wyrd was a cosmic tapestry that depicted each person's life.

The day of the week Friday is derived from "Frigg's Day." The word "Freya" itself is not a name, but the word for lady. The German word "Frau" is derived from Freya.

Our CWSG website

There are some misconceptions and concerns about our website which I would like to address so we are all on the same page.

Our website is secure, the security certificate is renewed yearly, the website is behind a fire wall and we have a weekly scan by Malware Removal, an anti-virus service; crooks may try to attack it but will go somewhere else when they don't succeed. You can tell a secure site because the url starts with https (the "s" at the end), or your browser may tell you that it's secure. Never enter websites that are not secure, either by neglect or as traps, because they are a good source for hackers.

The other concern seems to be that of email addresses being posted on the website. Of course, we want people to find us, but having someone's email address is not harmful. When I email you I have no way of seeing what is on your computer or accessing it, not any more than having your home address lets me know what is inside your house or allows me to get in! All our email addresses are in cyberspace (just like our cell phone numbers), so we are prone to receive unwanted emails.

But the only way for people to hack us in an email is for us to give them permission! We give the crooks "permission" when they send us an email and we click on a link to an affected site or download an affected file that they sent. But the email itself is harmless if we put it in the trash.

You may be thinking: I am not stupid, I don't click on unknown links or download unknown files. No, you are not stupid, but sometimes you are distracted; other times you are tired, or in a hurry, or you may be curious what who-you-think is-your-friend is sending you and.... One click and it's too late!

However, email addresses can be removed from the website. If so desired, just let Terry know. Of course, it would be counterproductive to have a website with no contact information, but the cvillewsg@gmail.com address could be used, provided it is checked regularly (it is currently listed on the website and hopefully someone is checking it!).
