Given that weaving, spinning, and sewing are generally solo pursuits, workshops allow me to spend time doing the things I love in the company of like-minded fiber enthusiasts. It's great fun to spend multiple days immersed in fun activities with folks who speak the same language. Many of those friendships have continued on Facebook and at subsequent workshops.

I also feel as though I harbored lots of pent-up demand for workshops built up over 15 years of parish ministry. It's difficult to take time away from the demands of parish work and all plans

are subject to change on account of parish emergencies. Since my retirement in 2018, I've relished the opportunity to sign up for workshops months in advance with a high probability that I will actually be able to attend.

CWSG Craftsmen's Guild Membership Notes

A co-op would be formed by the members that want to participate. Co-op members must be in good standing of CWSG.

Dues to the Craftsmen's Guild paid by participating co-op members. Chimneyville booth to be paid by those who want to sell at Chimneyville (not the demonstration booth).

We would join under ONE material (fiber) and TWO categories (weaving and spinning). Jurying fee and Craftsmen's Guild dues to be paid by those who want to participate, divided equally (\$155 total).

All judging of quality will be handled by the Craftsmen's Guild (jury, standards committee, Rhonda, etc.). All verification of original work will be the responsibility of the craftsperson (although Rhonda said she could follow up on this if we think that someone has copied). Pieces and monies to be turned in in January for 2020 jurying.

Our joining as a group/studio has no impact on individual Craftsmen's Guild members/fellows (e.g., Marcy, Marva, Kathy, Sharon), who would continue on their own.

Three(?) items must be submitted and 10 pictures for jurying into the Craftsmen's Guild. Joining the co-op will happen each January. We could get standards to look at any new member work coming in after the initial jurying and before the next jury.

To be determined: checking account, officers, tags for sale items, meetings (after regular CWSG meetings?), addendum newsletter for co-op.
