President's Message

Guild Sales Update and Survey Results

Our guild has stumbled upon a great way to make money! Last year we revamped our bi-

monthly white elephant sales and instead held one big sale at our Sheep to Shawl demonstration in March. We raised \$750 for our guild! We offered a similar sale at Roc Day and raised another \$1,300 for the guild! We plan to host another sale at Sheep to Shawl on March 14.

This unexpected income of more than \$2,000 over the past year got me to thinking about how guild members might like to see that money used. And so, I created a



short, simple survey to garner your thoughts. Sixteen of our members responded and here's some of what I heard.

More than half the respondents said that we should spend this money to expand or enhance our guild. Five folks believe we should hang onto this money for future needs and two more said we should put the money in a savings account or certificate of deposit. (Note that we have \$1,000 currently in a certificate of deposit, which will mature in March 2020.)

In thinking about how we might expand or enhance our guild, the majority of responses called for underwriting the cost of workshops. Three people think we should underwrite the cost of a retreat. Two people suggested we purchase more equipment (such as rigid heddle or table looms) to rent to members, while one respondent pointed out that rental equipment can

be difficult to track and maintain.

Suggestions about workshops were spread across both weaving and spinning with color coming in third. Responses overwhelmingly called for workshops geared toward those with some experience (vs. those aimed at beginners or advanced workshops).

Responses were also very clear about the preference for workshops of 2-3 days (vs. shorter or longer) to be held on weekends (vs. during the week).

The final question was about funding scholarships for guild members to attend classes elsewhere. Some respondents expressed interest in this option while others said they preferred for us to offer local workshops that in which all our members could participate.

Thanks to all who shared their opinions in this quick-and-dirty, unofficial survey. My goal is to use this information, and any other comments received, as your board makes plans for 2021 and beyond.

CWSG Co-op Corner

Following the guild vote in December to form a co-op to pursue membership in the Craftsmen's Guild of Mississippi under the medium of fiber and the categories of weaving and spinning, we have taken several steps to prepare our submission for jury consideration in March. We currently have 13 CWSG members who have applied to be a part of the co-op, paid their dues, and signed statements of originality in their work. (Note that the deadline for joining the co-op this year is midnight on Friday, Jan. 31, 2020.) We've also gathered three samples of weaving, three samples of spinning, and more than five photographs of additional weaving and spinning for our submission. Marcy Petrini has drafted an artists' statement for the co-op and is working on our professional résumé. Sharon Williams will prepare all of our items for submission to the jury by 5 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 28, 2020. We expect to receive the jury's decision by mid-March.

New Weaving, Spinning Classes Set

Designing Twills

Mondays, Feb. 10 and Feb. 24 – April 6; 6-8:30 p.m.; Bill Waller Sr. Craft Center

Learn how to design your own twill patterns and weave a set of 4 placemats based on your design. *Students must be able to dress a shaft loom and do a drawdown independently as a prerequisite for this class*. Weekly required discussions by Marcy Petrini and Kathy Perito,



instructors and exhibiting members of the Craftsmen's Guild of Mississippi, will focus on the structure of twills, how twills are different from other weaves, how to sett the warp, how to vary treadlings, and the appropriateness of twills for a variety of cloths, from scarves to rugs. Class cost is \$280, non-refundable, which includes a monograph on twills and one on project planning. Students will provide their own yarns **as specified in the first session**. Class size is limited to eight students, but a minimum of four participants is required to conduct the class. Paid registration must be received by Thursday, Feb. 6, to secure a spot in this class.
