February Meeting Minutes

The February meeting of the CWSG was called to order Feb. 15, 2020, at the Bill Waller Sr. Craft Center in Ridgeland, Miss., by President Beth Palmer. A quorum was determined with 15 members present.

A motion to accept the agenda as presented was made by Donna Peyton and seconded by Debra Sue Pate. The motion carried. A motion to approve the minutes of the December meeting as printed in the January newsletter was made by Judy Foster and seconded by Debbie Stringer. The motion was approved.

The first item of Old Business was the summary report of Roc Day. There were 97 registered attendees with 80 persons actually attending. Inclement weather was a contributing factor in a number of persons not being able to attend. CWSG members who registered and could not attend should pick up goodie bags at the Craft Center; goodie bags will be mailed to other registrants who could not attend. Attendees enjoyed vendors, exhibits, a show-and-tell area, a delicious box lunch, door prizes, and fellowship. The event was also a financial success. Roc Day 2021 will be hosted by the New Orleans Weavers Guild.

Sharon Williams gave an update on the progress of the CWSG Co-op. The pieces for evaluation have been collected. The deadline for membership submission is Feb. 28. Currently 15 members have requested to join the co-op.

Sheep to Shawl, on March 14, 2020, will take the place of the March meeting. Plans for this yearly event at the Bill Waller Sr. Craft Center were presented by Donna Peyton. Members were given the opportunity to sign up for demonstrations and other areas of participation. A fiber-related sales booth will once again be held at the event, and members were encouraged to donate items for sale and to collect items after the event that do not sell. Potluck lunch will be available for guild members in the kitchen area. A fiber exhibit in the George Berry Gallery will be held in conjunction with Sheep to Shawl. The deadline to submit items for exhibit is Friday, March 13. Sharon Williams is in charge of hanging the exhibit.

In the area of New Business, President Beth Palmer recommended with board approval that a certificate of deposit maturing in March be cashed out and the money transferred to a savings account. Marcy Petrini so moved and Sharon Williams seconded the motion. Motion carried by voice vote. A discussion of a recent informal survey regarding the financial future of the guild included several possibilities for expenditures such as underwriting workshops and retreats, and providing scholarships and grants for members to attend conferences.

After a brief show-and-tell by some of the members present, the meeting was adjourned. An informative program on *Specialty Looms* was presented by members Patricia Holmberg, Sharon Williams, Nancy Hester, and Marcy Petrini.
