April Meeting Minutes

The April meeting of CWSG was called to order on April 16, 2020, by President Beth Palmer. Due to the coronavirus quarantine, the meeting was held by Zoom videoconferencing. A quorum was determined with 13 members present. A motion to accept the agenda as presented was accepted by acclamation.

The first item of new business was approval of the slate of candidates for office for terms that will be expiring next month. The selection committee (Beverly Anglin, Donna Peyton) submitted the following candidates for office: Nancy Hester for treasurer, Jeanne Marie Peet for secretary, and Janet Lee for librarian/historian. Brenda Harrower moved and Marcy Petrini seconded that we accept the slate of candidates presented by the selection committee. Motion carried. A motion to accept the candidates by acclamation was made by Beverly Anglin and seconded by Kathy Perito. Motion carried by voice vote. The new terms will begin at our May meeting.



From Beth Palmer: Some of you may know that I got a new kitchen recently, completed just in time for our quarantine! One of my goals is to have handmade towels (and, one day, curtains) in my kitchen. This first set of towels uses a twill pattern called "Circle and Diamond" from the Nov/Dec 2019 issue of Handwoven. I'm using 8/2 cotton by Maurice Brassard et Fils, which is more tightly spun than some other brands of the same size yarn. I changed the colors to go with my new kitchen, which has teal cabinets with gray countertops. I wove the first towel with royal blue weft that matches two of the warp stripes. The second towel uses kelly green weft, which is not used in the warp. I like this second towel better as the pattern shows through on all the stripes. I need to finish these soon and put them into service drying dishes!

Plans for a celebration of the Lifetime Membership designation for Sharon Williams were discussed. Due to the ongoing quarantine, this celebration will most likely be held next fall.

Events that have been postponed/cancelled due to the COVID-19 quarantine were noted. The next meeting of CWSG will be Saturday, May 16, at 10 a.m., probably on Zoom. The scheduled program may be modified. The retreat for this year has been delayed until at least the fall and probably 2021. A decision on Convergence 2020 in Knoxville will be forthcoming from HGA.

After a show-and-tell of lovely items that have been created by members, the meeting was adjourned.


Had a great time weaving these cotton face cloths (below) for a friend's business. Each is 100% cotton, woven in the windowpane pattern on a rigid heddle loom.
