Spring Brings Rebirth

Ten years ago, when I moved to MS, I purchased fabric to make curtains for my dining room. The fabric was expensive (\$8/yard as I recall) and was actually batik fabric meant for quilting. Nevertheless, I sewed curtains out of the fabric. They graced my dining room windows for several years until I found more appropriate (heavier) fabric to replace them.

Troubled by how much I had spent on the original fabric, I squirreled it away for a future project. I'm thrilled to say that the batik fabric's rebirth is now complete! I sliced the fabric into 1" strips to use as weft in some placemats for my updated



kitchen. I saved some fabric to sew napkins to go with the placemats. I'm pleased with the results and excited that these cloth napkins might help us kick the paper napkin habit.

I hope that spring also brings rebirth to your weaving!

The twill from Davison is called a Shaded Twill, it's a combination of undulating twill and basket weave

Plain Weave Scarf. I used the same variegated yarn for both warp and weft in this scarf, woven on a 15-inch rigid heddle loom. As I wove, I cut the weft a couple times to force abrupt changes in color, making a few horizontal stripes (the lazy one-shuttle way). I like the resulting mix of soft and hard color changes throughout the scarf.









Library Corner
