You know these ladies from their past work as volunteers supporting the organization. We thought you'd like to know a bit more about their weaving or spinning passions. We asked each of them to tell us about their favorite project and why it is special to them. Here's what they have shared.

Janet Lee

My favorite spinning project was from a few years ago when I processed a raw fleece, dyed the wool, carded the batts, and then spun chunky yarns which is what I enjoy using in my woven wall hangings. I did a lot of things wrong, and it is not the softest of yarn, but I really enjoyed being in control of all steps and getting to make all the creative decisions. I now have it displayed on a dress form for fun.



Jeanne Marie Peet

I've always had an interest in sewing and needlework since learning to sew around the age of 9 or 10 in small town Louisiana. (Anybody remember the 4-H apron?) Handweaving always intrigued me, but was never possible because of the time, cost, and space requirements. After retiring from Jackson Prep in 2016, I was volunteering at the Craft Center once a week when I saw a brochure for Beginning Weaving with Marcy Petrini and Kathy Perito. I signed up, and there my weaving adventures began.



When the pandemic shut down craft center events, I purchased a gently used Baby Wolf loom, which I now use for 4 and 8 shaft projects, mostly scarves, towels, placemats, and napkins. I've continued to participate in study groups by Zoom and look forward to in-person events returning to our Guild.

My favorite project to-date is a set of four turned twill teatowels in colors inspired by the significant women in the 2021 Inauguration. It was such a bad time in our history (political and racial hatred, covid, etc.) and the beautiful

colors worn by Kamala Harris, Jill Biden, Michelle Obama, Laura Bush, Hilary Clinton, and Amanda Gorman lifted my spirits, so I represented them in this project.

Heather Mitchell

To date, my favorite weaving project is the skirt I wove. I love the idea of designing garments, but I really don't like to sew all that much, but I love weaving. Double cloth/Double weave is such a fascinating thing to see come together and prior to doing it I was unaware that it could be done. I would have to say my skirt was and is my favorite because not only is it beautiful, but most times when I am weaving, even if I

already know it's going to be a scarf or towel, I always end up looking at the pattern and associating with a garment. I'm working on a scarf now and the pattern in it would make a really nice vest, but when I made my skirt, I got to see and touch the garment, oppose to just visualizing what a pattern would look like as an actual garment.



March 26, 2022 Meeting Minutes

The March meeting of the CWSG was called to order by President Nancy Hester on Saturday, March 26, 2022, at 10 a.m. on Zoom video conference. A quorum was determined with 8 members present. Debbie Stringer moved that the agenda be accepted. Marcy Petrini seconded, and the motion was approved. The minutes of the February 2022 meeting, as printed in the CWSG March 2022 newsletter, were approved upon a motion by Marcy Petrini and second by Debra Sue Pate.

Zoom conferencing will continue for the remainder of meetings through May 2022. The Annual Meeting will be held on April 16. Reports from committee heads and project chairmen will be given then. The nomination committee will present the new slate of board members to be considered at that meeting, and voting on the offices of Treasurer, Secretary, and Librarian/Historian will be by email after the April meeting.

In lieu of a summer retreat, having a summer meeting was discussed. Marcy Petrini moved that we have a summer meeting on Zoom, subject to change if necessary, and at a date to be determined. Debra Sue Pate seconded. The motion passed.

The proposed yarn dying workshop with Judy Busby at JEMS LUXE FIBERS in Vicksburg is tentatively scheduled for April 2 at 1 p.m., contingent on 6 people paying and attending. Debra Sue Pate will contact members who expressed interest about how to submit payment (\$40) to the workshop instructor.

Live demonstrations at the Craft Center will be allowed going forward.

The meeting was adjourned upon a motion by Jeanne Marie Peet.

Participants then enjoyed a video presentation from HGA's Textiles and Tea presented by Heavenly Bresser, an award-winning spinner. A brief show-and-tell followed the video presentation.

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
