Meet the Members: Spotlight on Alma Ellis

I was born/raised: I've lived all my life in Madison County. I grew up in Madison, with family ties to that town that are 200 years old. My husband and I moved out in the county, closer to Flora, almost 40 years ago.

Family: My husband, Carroll, and I have been married for 48 years. We have one son, a lovely DIL, and two wonderful grandsons.

Work: I retired in 2019 after a 42-year career. When I retired, I'd been working for 22 years as a special project director with the Institute of Disability Studies at the University of Southern Mississippi. I began my career as a newspaper writer/photographer, moved on to 14 years of corporate



communication/public relations, then went into state government as a writer—lots of reports, magazines, brochures, grants.

How I became interested in weaving/spinning/fiber art

I tell people I'm a begin-again weaver. I started in the '80s, but I didn't get back to it until the 2000s. Like many, my interest in weaving began with garment sewing. My mom, who sewed beautifully, taught me to sew in grade school and helped me to progress to garments as a clothes-loving teen. I first became interested in weaving by watching demonstrations at Pleasant Hill, a restored Shaker village in Kentucky. My aunt worked there, and when we visited, I would always head to the fiber building. There was an aha moment—as a weaver, you can make your own fabric for your garments! I finally got around to taking a class from Marcy Petrini in the early '80s when she was teaching weaving as part of the Millsaps Community Enrichment Programs. But I was a full-time working wife and mom with a small child so I didn't get back to weaving until I bought my first loom when my son graduated from college.

How I became interested in CWSG; How long I've been a member:

Marva Goodman and I would see each other at the knifemaking activities our husbands attended. I knew Marva wove and spun so I always cornered her to question her about weaving. She helped me decide on a loom and directed me to former member Melba Nipper to make that Schact Baby Wolf purchase in 2007. I also attended a ROC Day meeting at the invitation of Jane Dollar who was a friend of one of my sisters. After piddling around at the loom on my own for a couple of years, I attended my first CWSG meeting at Marva's invitation in September 2010 and joined that day.

The Annual Guild Meeting of the CWSG was called to order by President Nancy Hester on Saturday, May 21, 2022, at 10 a.m. on Zoom video conference. A quorum was determined with 14 members present. Debbie Stringer moved that the agenda be accepted. Donna Peyton seconded, and the motion was approved. The minutes of the April 16, 2022, meeting, as printed in the CWSG May 2022 newsletter, were presented. Corrections to the minutes in paragraph 2 to include "the motion passed" instead of "the vote passed" and to add "and no write-in votes on the absentee ballot" were noted by Debra Sue Pate. Lynn Watkins moved to amend the minutes as stated and Debra Sue Pate seconded. The minutes were approved as amended and will be recorded.

The summer meeting, to be held on Zoom in lieu of a summer retreat, was set for August 7, 2022, from 2 - 3:30 p.m.
