

Roc Day Tradition

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What We Know about Twelfth Night

In Rome, Italy, where I grew up in the middle ages – ok, in the middle of the last century – we celebrated the Christmas holidays starting December 24 with a big dinner. From then till January 6, Epiphany, there

were family, friends, food, wine and games. On January 6, "la Befana" would leave gifts for the good children and coals for the bad ones.
The following day, January 7th, "St.

Distaff Day" (not a real saint), it was back to work, school, routine life.



The distaff is a tool that holds unspun fiber to make is easier for the spinner to handle. It is particularly important when spinning flax into linen yarn since the



fibers are very long. The flax is combed for the distaff. The shorter fiber left behind, the tow, is used for rougher fabrics, sacks for grains, for example.

A ribbon holds the fiber on the distaff. The distaff is used with both spindles and wheels.

Flax is grown in cold climates. Belgium linen is legendary for its beauty.

Distaffs range from a simple stick to elaborate examples in some cultures. The distaff was so important in Lithuania, for example, that a fellow wanting to impress a lady for potential marriage would carve her a distaff. The distaff in this picture is a recent one from the Baltics. It is nice that the carving tradition continues.

The distaff is called rock or rocken or roc in German.

The Legend

Probably based on Robert Herrick's poem, the legend is that the women would return to spinning on St. Distaff's day, but the men wouldn't return to their fields until Plough Day, the Monday after Twelfth Night.

"If the maid's a-spinning go Burn the flax and Fire the tow."

There are a few holes in this legend: can you imagine anybody burning flax? Getting the fiber from the plant is an arduous process and I can't imagine that anybody in the 17th century (when the poem was written) would waste precious materials. Spinning get togethers have been documented, but getting to work was serious business, which probably didn't include having to fend ploughmen. Also, Plough Day seems a bit strange in a country where winter snow covers the fields. Other farm chores were done, Twelfth Night or not. But the merrymaking that the poem would have us believe is the basis for our Roc Day.

The Roc Day Tradition

In Colonial times, spinners would get together on St. Distaff's Day, for "Rock Day", to spin together, like a quilting bee.

More recently, in the 70s, Irene Miller, owner of the Niddy Noddy shop in Croton-on-the-Hudson, NY, started a Roc Day as our Colonial foremothers did. Spinners came from near and far to the Niddy Noddy.

Loom for a donation:

Carolyn Hudson says: I have a loom that needs a new home if anyone is interested. I never even put it together, it came from another member of the guild. I am not really sure what exactly it is but I think a Nilus LeClerc Loom, 45" I think? It is big! Anyway, I made a \$150 donation to the Guild when I took ownership and would request that whoever could use this fabulous loom do something similar to benefit our Guild (Craftsmen's Guild of Mississippi).




Through this class you will gain an understanding of the terminology, tools and techniques used in weaving. More advanced classes will be offered later.



Participants will weave a scarf which will incorporate various twills to study the designs that result from the interaction of threading and treadling.

Participants must know how to wind a warp and dress the loom. Directions for the twill scarf will be provided. Weekly discussions will cover the various topics found in the 121-page monograph *Re-Inventing Twills* which is also provided.



All equipment is available to students for the duration of the class during which the projects must be completed. Participants will provide their own yarns, appropriate for the scarf, 10/2 cotton or 10/2 Tencel which will be discussed in the 1st session.

Classes will be held in the Weaving Loft at the Bill Waller Craft Center.

The class is taught by Craftsmen's Guild Fellow Marcy Petrini who has been teaching at the Craft Center and around the country for many years.
