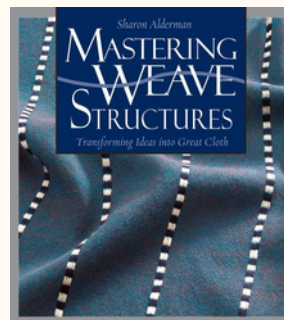

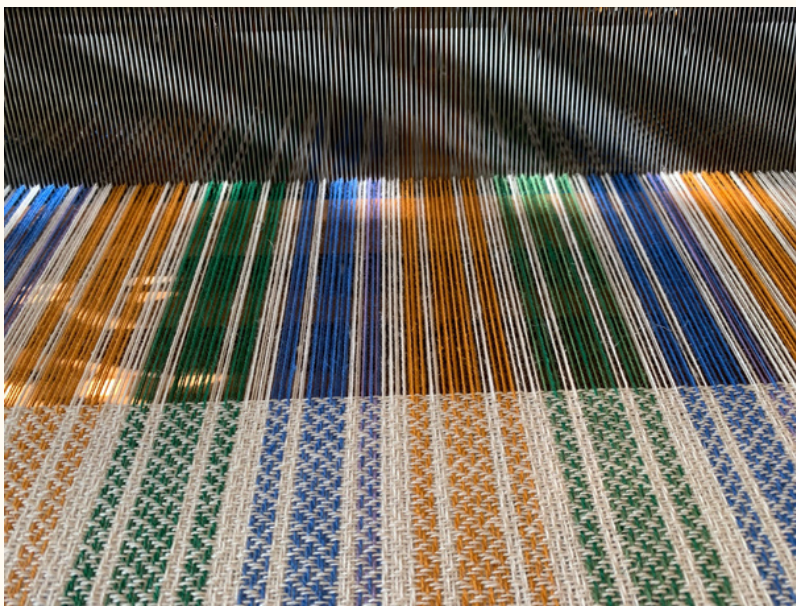
More than just a survey of interlacements from simple to intricate, this thoughtful addition to every crafter's library is a study course for weaving the best, most interesting, most successful fabrics imaginable. A liberating voice is given to each instruction, empowering weavers to discover the basic how-tos of their craft, such as how to design threadings, channel the design power of the tie-up, and make the most of threading options, as well as understand fibers, setts, and color interactions. Aspiring weavers will draw both inspiration and useful information from the clear explanations, wonderful examples, and color photographs of stunning fabrics featured throughout. This introduction to the fundamental principles of weave structure is the result of more than 30 years of serious study and is destined to become a classic for all weavers.

Call to Order	Reports
- Meeting called to order by President Alma Ellis at 10:04 a.m. - With 18 members present, a quorum was met (25% of membership needed). - Approval of Minutes from February 15, 2025 - Nancy Hester moved to approve the February 2025 minutes as published in the March 2025 newsletter. Sharon Williams seconded. - Motion passed and minutes were accepted.	- Gio Chinchar presented the Treasurer's Report. Gio also discussed rewards programs from Woolery and Halcyon Yarns that provide revenue for the guild. - Marcy Petrini reported the work of the Nominating Committee. The slate of officers selected by the committee are Janet Lee, President; Donna Peyton, Vice-President; and Jacqueline Dutsch, Librarian/Historian. There were no nominations from the floor. - Judy Foster moved to close the nominations and Craig Hallstrom seconded. Jeanne Marie Peet moved to accept the slate of candidates recommended by the Nominating Committee. Mary Craft seconded. - The candidates were unanimously elected. Six absentee votes in favor of the slate also recorded. - Janet Lee reported a successful Sheep to Shawl Program with attendance of over 100 at the Craft Center.

- Members were encouraged to complete the Workshop Interest Forms. - Opportunities to participate in summer programs sponsored by the Madison County Library System are available. The first one will be June 9 in Canton. More information later.	- Jacqueline Dutsch moved that we make a donation of \$500 to the Craft Center for the use of the building for meetings and Sheep to Shawl. - Nancy Hester seconded. Motion carried. - Sharon Williams called for fiber art items to be exhibited in the MS Delta Arts Alliance Exhibit in Cleveland, MS, beginning October 2, for a two week exhibition. - Sharon requested two articles of superior quality from each member. - Sharon explained the roles and relationships of the CWSG and the CWSG Co-Op for interested members.

	Jeanne Marie Peet moved that the meeting adjourn. After a brief Show and Tell, members were invited to browse books and fiber art pieces donated to the guild by the family of Debbie Amzal. Suggested donations to guild were listed for members wishing to acquire any of the items. After a potluck lunch, members demonstrated at the Craft Center.
